Manchester Hospital School serves the needs of a very large and diverse range of children, young people and their families at times when they are extremely vulnerable. Our core purpose as a school is to uphold the child's right to Education and our policies and procedures are necessary to keep staff and children safe . We acknowledge that our students are often living with a range of very complex medical conditions including mental ill health and therefore we keep the needs of the student at the heart of all decisions. We will, therefore, work within the parameters of all statutory policies whilst seeking to understand and support the child's long term education and health needs.

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1. Introduction

Our young people are growing up in a globalised society in which a range of languages and cultures are just a click or a tap away. They will have more international experiences available to them in terms of travel, cuisine, employment and culture than any previous generation. However, they are also growing up in times of uncertainty and increasingly polarised viewpoints within society, so it is important that we provide them with a curriculum that educates them about and celebrates the vast number of cultures that exist both within the UK and internationally. This is particularly important in our context, in which pupils with medical or social, emotional and mental health (SEMH) issues may feel even more detached from society than their peers accessing mainstream education.

2. Aims

Manchester Hospital School aims to offer all pupils a range of experiences to enhance their learning and raise awareness of their local, national and international identity. We seek to encourage pupils to take up their role as open-minded and forward-thinking citizens of the world through curricular and extracurricular activities that enrich pupils' cultural capital and global understanding, as we believe this will have a powerful impact on their future working and personal lives.

Through our international work, we encourage pupils to:

- have an awareness of countries, languages and cultures other than their own;
- respect and value different cultures and beliefs;
- develop curiosity about daily life in other countries;
- be prepared for life in a diverse global society and for work in a global economy;
- understand the future opportunities open to them beyond Manchester and the UK;
- participate in society as active and responsible global citizens.

At a whole-school level, the Global faculty (led by a Lead Practitioner and comprising History, Geography, Religious Education and Languages) takes the lead in developing pupils' international knowledge, supported by other staff and departments.

3. Curriculum Offer: Leo Kelly School & Galaxy House

At the Leo Kelly School and Galaxy House we offer a broad curriculum, which develops knowledge of the world through:

- The discrete teaching of History, Geography, Religious Education (RE) and Spanish as separate lessons at Key Stage 3 (KS3);
- Incorporating international themes into topics in other subjects, such as Global Cultures (KS3 Art), Genre and Culture (KS4 Music) and Diverse Short Stories (KS3 English);
- Working on projects with schools in other countries in Preparation for Adulthood lessons.

4. Curriculum Offer: Hospitals

4a. Primary

At Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS), Key Stage 1 (KS1) and Key Stage 2 (KS2), pupils' international understanding is primarily developed through our Learning Means the World curriculum. This is a cross-curricular approach to ensure that there is coverage of non-core subjects for our primary pupils in a hospital setting.

Pupils develop their understanding of topics relating to the world around them at local, national and international levels through topics such as Come Fly With Me - Asia (EYFS), Paddington's Passport (Year 2), Window on the World (Year 3) and A World of Bright Ideas (Year 6). Pupils are also taught RE (EYFS, KS1 and KS2) and Spanish (KS2).

4b. Secondary

At our hospital sites, we promote international education at secondary through:

- Offering all pupils the opportunity to continue studying French or Spanish;
- Our Humanities curriculum offer, teaching History, Geography and RE through engaging themes such as 'Africa: Past, Present & Future' and 'Eurovision & the Cold War';
- Incorporating international themes into topics in other subjects, such as Diverse Short Stories (Year 9 English) and Identity (KS3/4 Art).

4c. PMLD/SLD

Our pupils with Profound Multiple Learning Difficulties (PMLD) and Severe Learning Difficulties (SLD) have complex learning needs that can be compounded by their medical condition. The aim of our PMLD and SLD curriculum is to develop pupils' skills in the four broad areas of need identified in the SEN Code of Practice (Communication and Interaction, Cognition and Learning, Physical and Sensory and Social, Emotional and Mental Health). Key skills are taught through stimulating contexts for learning, including a topic on 'Weather, travel and the world'.

5. Extracurricular Offer

As part of our extracurricular offer, we want to provide pupils with the opportunity to develop their knowledge of the world beyond what they learn in formal lessons. Each year, the school prepares a cultural calendar that links to extracurricular enrichment activities.

In the past, these activities have included:

- Completing the British Council Great Languages Challenge on European Day of Languages;
- Watching an interview with a survivor to mark Holocaust Memorial Day;
- Trips, visitors and form-time activities relating to Black History Month, LGBT+ History Month, International Women's Day, Human Rights Day and World Book Day.

6. Associated Schemes and Awards

As part of our commitment to meaningful international education, Manchester Hospital School aims to achieve and maintain:

- The British Council International Schools Award (ISA);
- The UNICEF Rights Respecting Schools Award (RRSA);
- European Parliament Ambassador School status.
